



PRELUDE

Today's prelude is the American premiere of a work Edward Landin commissioned by American organist and composer Pamela Decker. The world premiere took place this past August during a recital he gave at the Evangelische Saalkirchengemeinde in Ingelheim am Rhein, Germany. Please enjoy the following notes the composer has written about her new piece:

Praeludium was commissioned by the American concert organist Edward Landin as a tribute to the north German Baroque composer and organist Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707). The north German stylus phantasticus—with its many influences and references, including the toccata tradition, the prevalence of improvisation, rhetoric, Italian elements, French opera, 16th-century polyphony, fugal procedures, and the German concept of Affekt-was exemplified in brilliant and glorious fashion by the organ praeludia of Buxtehude. Improvisatory and theatrical opening passages (the exordium) led to fugues that would dissolve into dramatic silences (the aposiopesis described by music theorist Joachim Burmeister), followed by newlyarriving fugues alternating with toccata-like flourishes. Fugal segments were considered to be a "confirmation" (the confirmatio) of established material within the work, while some of the more adventurous passages were seen as presenting argument (the confutatio). Finally, these praeludia conclude with the peroratio, which comprises a brilliant summary and conclusion. This commissioned Praeludium of our own time pays homage to the many influences that resulted in the stylus phantasticus; at the same time, the harmonic and melodic materials belong to a 21st-century language based on synthetic modes and multicultural elements that range across many musical categories (South American rhythms, flamenco modal patterns, German contrapuntal devices, etc.). The rhetorical elements of exordium, confirmatio, confutatio, and peroratio are very much alive and present in the work. The boundaries of these segments might be drawn in various ways depending upon an individual performer's view, but the rhetorical "anatomy" is in evidence. The intention is to celebrate Buxtehude's drama, color, and vitality while speaking in a modern language.
